# An Overview of the Africa Continental Free Trade Agreement (AfCFTA)

54 Countries have signed the Agreement including Ghana, Nigeria and Senegal

Largest free trade area by number of member states, after the World Trade Organization

Potential market size made up of 1.2 billion people

An aggregate GDP of up to \$2.5 trillion

enlightening members about AfCFTA opportunities



Facilitate Market Linkages –

connecting members to regional markets



Support Digital Innovations –

leveraging technology to drive product branding, marketing, etc



**Capacity Building -**

building members' capacity to produce market-ready goods



Increase Advocacy –

negotiating contracts with buyers, promoting inclusion of private sector actors in the policy-making process
